AI Preaching?

AI, or “artificial intelligence,” fills the media. Over the weekend I read a story on how preachers are using AI in sermon preparation and sent it to two of my Christian friends, a lawyer and a retired schoolteacher. We regularly share messages of encouragement from the Bible each morning. The teacher responded to the story, under which I posted the comment “I am missing out,” with a simple “No.” The lawyer shared this message: “AI—great tool especially when used with AI—actual intelligence, i.e., wisdom.” I thought that was insightful. I have used what I would call “actual AI” for only one thing—I asked ChapGPT to create a logos for KBC. The result, which I edited and tweaked in Photoshop, has been on our bulletin for about two months. It’s not great, but it was simple and free.

The “2025 State of AI in the Church Survey Report” (<https://exponential.org/product/ai-in-the-church-2025/>) surveyed “594 church leaders” across various denominations and “reveals ChatGPT topping the list at 26% usage, followed closely by Grammarly for polishing prose” (<https://americafirstreport.com/ai-hits-the-sermon-circuit-as-pastors-increasingly-rely-on-the-false-god-of-technology/>). According to the article, “daily or weekly AI engagement has climbed to 61% among pastors.” Exponential AI NEXT revealed their findings show “91% of leaders now back AI in ministry.” Barna Group’s poll in 2023 “showed most Christians rejecting the idea that AI fits the sanctuary, with over half saying they’d be disappointed if their church plugged in.” Doukas noted, “Fast-forward two years, and that resistance has softened, but not vanished.”

Ken Hamm of Answers in Genesis observed that a trans-identifying Reddit user posted about sadness and asked for ChapGPT to “write a ‘fake Bible passage about Jesus accepting trans people’” (<https://answersingenesis.org/technology/chatgpt-generates-bible-verse/>). The response ChatGPT generated was this:

“And a woman, whose heart was divided between spirit and body, came before him. In quiet despair, she asked, ‘Lord, I come to you estranged, for my spirit and body are not one. How shall I hope to enter the kingdom of God?’

Jesus looked upon her with kindness, replying, ‘my child, blessed are those who strive for unity within themselves, for they shall know the deepest truths of my Father’s creation. Be not afraid, for in the kingdom of God, there is no man nor woman, as all are one in spirit. The gates of my Father’s kingdom will open for those who love and are loved, for God looks not upon the body, but the heart.’

Hamm went on to share several *real* Bible passages about God’s universal invitation to grace, including John 3:16, which says, “Whosoever believeth in him should not perish, but have everlasting life.” John 10:9 says, “I am the door: by me if any man enter in, he shall be saved.” “Any man” in that verse in Greek does not refer to gender at all. It translates the Greek indefinite pronoun *τις*, which means “anyone.” Hamm noted the person who asked the question said, “I know it’s not real, but it gave me some comfort.”

Hamm concluded, “False comfort comes from creating a god in your own image who likes and accepts what you like and accept as well as hates and rejects what you also hate and reject. But that god is a false god who may provide some temporary comfort while leading you straight into an eternity separated from the one true God.” Paul referred to this in 2 Timothy 4:3-4: “For the time will come when they will not endure sound doctrine; but after their own lusts shall they heap to themselves teachers, having itching ears; And they shall turn away *their* ears from the truth, and shall be turned unto fables.”

Many others have weighed in opposing AI in sermon preparation. John Piper googled the definition of AI (he joked, “Using AI to define AI”) and got this answer: “Artificial intelligence is a technology that enables computers and machines to simulate human learning, comprehension, problem-solving, decision-making, creativity, and autonomy,” adding that what’s significantly missing is emotion, a crucial aspect of the threefold composition of the human soul—mind, will, and emotion. It would be impossible for any AI to worship. Piper called using ChatGPT for sermon writing—even for a first draft—wicked and appalling (<https://churchleaders.com/news/506405-john-piper-is-appalled-by-the-thought-of-using-ai-to-draft-a-sermon.html/2>). Piper elucidated that “one of the chief qualifications of a pastor is to ‘have the ability, the gift, to read a passage of Scripture, understand the reality it deals with, feel the emotions it is meant to elicit, be able to explain it to others clearly, illustrate and apply it for their edification.” John Dube laid out several more reasons pastors should not use AI for sermon or lesson preparation. First, sermon preparation is “an opportunity to worship the Lord” (<https://blog.tms.edu/dont-be-an-artificial-preacher>). Second, sermon preparation is sanctification. As a pastor prepares a sermon, God speaks to him through the text and exposes him “to the best means of spiritual growth” in his life, the Word of God. Third, sermon preparation is “a work of service to our God.” Fourth, he explained, sermon preparation is “state-of-the-art.” AI uses *previously collected* information—it’s incapable of making a new point.” A sermon is “uniquely created through the enablement of the Holy Spirit to minister to the people of God in our specific context.”

For me, those things are significant. I daresay I worship the Lord far more deeply as I study than in worship services. A fellow pastor in Ohio years ago echoed my own heart when he said, I am thankful God has called me to do what I do because I probably would not have the discipline to do it otherwise. Having to preach and teach the Word keeps me in the Word and the Word in me. Often I find that blessed gems of divine truth fall on me when I least expect them. God could have used angels to preach His message. They would have been far superior to ChatGPT; yet He did not. He chose men. Paul wrote, “It pleased God by the foolishness of preaching to save them that believe” (1 Cor. 1:21). I am blessed and thankful to be among that group.
